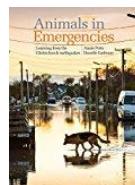

Lessons Learned from the Grenfell Tower (Magazine article)

On 14 June, 2017, a fire in Grenfell Tower, a London apartment building, killed 71 people and within 30 minutes consumed the exterior wall of 20 out of 24 floors. The fire spread over the highly combustible material used to insulate the exterior wall. It then extended through acrylic plastic windows and quickly spread throughout the building, making it impossible for many occupants to escape.

When houses are built close to forests or other types of natural vegetation, they pose two problems related to wildfires. First, there will be more wildfires due to human ignitions. Second, wildfires that occur will pose a greater risk to lives and homes, they will be hard to fight, and letting natural fires burn becomes impossible. We examined the number of houses that have been built since 1990 in the United States in or near natural vegetation, in an area known as the wildland-urban interface (WUI), and found that a large number of houses have been built

The European Emergency Number Association (EENA) and Waze, have published the final report on a pilot project entitled *Exploring the use of Waze for emergency response*. The report notes that, while many factors contribute to the effectiveness of an emergency response, time has always been a determining criterion for the success of rescue operations EENA and Waze launched a pilot project to understand if – and how – using traffic data could improve of emergency response operations. Waze provides real-time, anonymous, incident or delay-related information directly from the source, i.e. the drivers themselves.

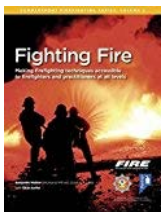

The effect of woody fuel characteristics on fuel ignition and consumption: a case study from a eucalypt forest in south-west Western Australia

We investigated how the physical characteristics of woody fuels (> 0.6 cm diameter) affected their ignition and consumption. Ignition success was explained by woody fuel arrangement, suspension and decay status.

Consumption was greater for fuels in advanced stages of decay, but suspension (inversely related) and arrangement (directly related) also affected the outcome.

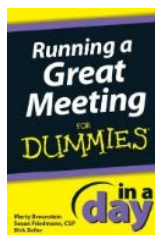

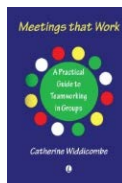

Relationships between mature trees and fire fuel hazard in Australian forest (Journal article)

International Journal of Wildland Fire Vol 27 No 5 2018

Increasing density of mid-storey vegetation since European settlement has been observed in forests and woodlands in several parts of the world and may result in greater fire fuel hazard. This phenomenon is often attributed to a longer interval between fires since European settlement, but may also be influenced by tree removal during the same period. The authors hypothesised that the number of mature trees in a stand reduces mid-storey vegetation cover and the associated fire fuel hazard through competition. To test this hypothesis, they examined these associations in south-eastern Australia.

Intense fire is a key threatening process for the endangered Blue Mountains water skink, *Eulamprus leuraensis*. This species is restricted to isolated, densely vegetated and waterlogged peat swamps in montane south-eastern Australia. The authors surveyed 11 swamps (5 unburnt, 6 burnt) over 2 years, before and after the intense spring bushfires of 2013, to quantify the fires' impacts on these skinks, other lizards and the habitat upon which they depend.
