National Parks and Wildlife Service have partnered with Taronga Conservation Society Australia to develop a training course on wildlife first response for NSW firefighters. The online course is complemented by an interactive handbook that firefighters can take with them on the fireground. It is important to note that use of the handbook does not qualify a person to rescue and rehabilitate wildlife. Access to a fireground is only permitted with the approval of the Incident Controller and by personnel with relevant qualifications and necessary skills in wildlife handling.







Internationally, fire and land management agencies are increasingly using forms of predictive services to inform wildfire planning and operational response. This trend is particularly pronounced in Australia. The article's results indicate that, rather than simply invest in tools and systems, there is a need for fire management agencies to foster personal connection between predictive services practitioners, their tools and their users.

Assessing the role of short-term weather forecasts in fire manager tactical decision-making: a choice experiment
(Journal article)

Weather plays an integral role in fire management due to the direct and indirect effects it has on fire behaviour. However, fire managers may not use all information available to them during the decision-making process, instead utilising mental shortcuts that can bias decision-making. It is important to evaluate if (and how) fire managers use information like weather forecasts when making tactical decisions.

Firefighter Injuries on the Fireground
(US report)

NFPA, October 2021

This report reviews injuries experience by US firefighters on the fireground for the five-year period from 2015-2019. United States firefighters experienced an average of 24,950 non-fatal injuries on the fireground each year during this period and injuries caused by exposure to a hazard (such as heat, smoke, or toxic agents) and overexertion or strain together accounted for nearly half of the injuries. As a result of the 2020 COVID-related deaths, the total number of on-duty firefighter deaths in the US in 2020 was higher than has been reported since the late 1970s.







Increased extreme fire weather occurrence in southeast Australia and related atmospheric drivers (*Journal article*)
Weather and Climate Extremes, Vol 34, Dec 2021

There is evidence suggesting that fire activity in southeast Australia has increased in the past two decades. There is also anecdotal evidence that pyrocumulonimbus events have become more common, although the observed record is short. We explore the extent to which possible changes in fire and pyrocumulonimbus occurrence in southeast Australia can be explained by changes in the number of extreme (above the 95th percentile) days per year of two fire-weather indices, the Forest Fire Danger Index (FFDI) and the continuous Haines index (C-Haines).

Quantifying contributions of natural variability and anthropogenic forcings on increased fire weather risk over the western United States (*Journal article*)
Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences of the United States of America, 9 Nov 2021

This study explores the extent to which the increase in wildfire activity in the western United States (WUS) is due to weather pattern changes dominated by natural variability versus anthropogenic warming, a relationship that has been unclear with previous studies. Our observation-based estimate suggests ~one-third of the VPD trend is attributable to natural variability of atmospheric circulation, whereas ~two-thirds is explained by anthropogenic warming.



Neighbourhood issue: climate costs and risks to councils (Report)

Climate Council, 22 Oct 2021

As the level of government closest to the community, councils are at the heart of responding to climate impacts. When disaster strikes, local governments work closely with communities to cope and respond. They are also often left with the task of cleaning up – and paying for – the mess, while they keep delivering the essential services.
